LoTs helping to reduce waste

HAVE you ever heard of a new movement called 'The Australian Library of Things Network'? No? ... well join the club ... neither have I!!

A Library of Things enables members to borrow all sorts of useful items like gardening tools, catering and party gear, board games and more! Often called 'LoTs' for short, these incredible libraries offer members a way to borrow hundreds of items at a very low cost while reducing waste going to landfill.

Some Libraries of Things specialise in particular items, like tool libraries, kitchen libraries, even kite libraries!

And now there is a Blackwood Libraries of Things group, which will offer the community a viable way to share and maintain resources instead of buying - and that's a very good thing if we want to reduce our impact on the planet.

So in August, a group of enthusiastic supporters of The Blackwood Library of Things gathered at the Blackwood Uniting Church to discuss the project's ongoing development.

"During the meeting, numerous questions were raised, such as, a possible location, volunteer recruitment strategies, record-keeping methods, shelving acquisition plans, potential fees, insurance requirements, and possibly incorporating a recycling centre," explained Ian Naismith, spokesperson and local resident.

Additionally, attendees explored how to address situations when items within the library would require maintenance or repair.

The group collectively brainstormed a series of steps to move the project forward. These steps included identifying a suitable location, recruiting volunteers to assist in shaping the project, and, crucially, attracting members to participate.

Several potential solutions were discussed, including the option of sharing space with another organization, considering the use of a shipping container or similar structure, and starting with one day of operation per week, gradually expanding over time.

"A heartfelt thank you goes out to all those who attended the meeting and contributed their valuable insights. Special appreciation is extended to Joanna Wells, Mitcham Councillor Tom Morrison, and Waite MP Catherine Hutchesson for their dedicated representation and input," added Ian.

Lastly, the group expresses gratitude to the Blackwood Uniting Church for generously providing the use of their hall for the meeting.

To meet Australia's 2030 climate targets, we need to transition to a truly circular economy as fast as possible. By encouraging reuse and borrowing instead of buying, LoTs all over Australia are already making that change possible.

New complex will invigorate precinct

ONGOING developments to one of Blackwood's shopping precincts are finally seeing the light of day.

With the official opening of Blackwood Library and Community Centre (Tiwu Kumangka) last month, exciting things are afoot for the central shopping district.

The new two storey retail precinict to the west of Drake's Supermarket, will reach its completion toward the end of this year, with new tenants moving into the premises in January.

Tom Natsias, who has owned and operated 'Blackwood Health Food' for close to 40 years, has invested in bringing the project to fruition, noting that he was glad to be able to instigate the change.

"It's an evolution; Blackwood has been in need of an uplift for a long time and I'm happy to be able to be involved in shaping the vision," said Tom.

"With the new central walkway planned to include benches and trees alongside businesses offering food, it's going to be great to have somewhere people can grab something to eat and just sit and relax casually. It's going to become a central meeting point for the area."

The first stage of the building complex will see the twostorey structure currently under construction, finished in December, with tenants moving in during January 2024, ensuring no disruption to Christmas trade. "There will be a pilates studio going upstairs, as well as an internet security business. Then on the ground floor, Shakespeare's Books will take up a large shopfront at the end, while there is also a 50m² space still to be leased at the end of where my Health Food store will be located," explained Tom.

The remaining building will be demolished soon after the move, likely to be at the end of Jaunary, before the second development stage begins along the western boundary of Drake's Supermarket, with a second new building beginning construction shortly after.

The pedestrian corridor which will link the new shopping complex to the Blackwood Library and Community Centre (Tiwu Kumangka) will see an opening up of the precinct, allowing free thoroughfare and new places to meet and relax for the community.

Mitcham Mayor Dr Heather Holmes-Ross said of the developments, "we are continuing to invest in the Blackwood precinct for local business and our community.

"The new walkway will connect the shopping centre in a strategic north-south linkage, to better integrate Tiwu Kumangka with its surrounds.

"The new shops plus improved streetscaping and parking on Young Street, will create local jobs and attract further new investment in the Blackwood precinct," Heather added. \Box


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1950s 'snapshot' of life in the Mitcham Hills



This year, the Blackwood Action Group History team is using the monthly headlines from the 1955 editions of the 'Coromandel Newspaper' to provide readers with a 'snapshot' of life during the 1950s ...

'Gunpowder, Treason and Plot'



It commemorates the discovery of the Gunpowder Plot of 5 November 1605, when Guy Fawkes, a member of the conspirators, was found guarding explosives beneath the House of Lords in London, ready to blow up Parliament House during the opening of Parliament by the new monarch, James I.

To celebrate the King's survival, bonfires were lit around London. The conspirators were discovered and later executed.

However, it seems unlikely that families celebrating Guy Fawkes Night in Blackwood in the 1950s were much concerned about its origins.

These events featured a huge bonfire topped by the 'guy', an effigy of a man made of straw covered with old clothes.

As the fire burned, fireworks, mostly imported from China, were let off - catherine wheels, roman candles, throwdowns, flower pots, penny bungers, squibs, jumping jacks, crackers and skyrockets ... smaller children waved sparklers.

of their kennels.

The Blackwood RSL, the organisers of the event in 1954, saw it as another opportunity to raise funds for the their organisation and the new Blackwood Hospital.

As reported in 'The Coromandel' newspaper: 'Tonight we will offer you a lot of noise and a lot of fun. A happy idea for the folk who like their cuppa, will be the steady stream supplied by Mrs Prider's kiosk [Joan's Pantry].' (Coromandel 5 November 1954)

'A crowd of several thousand, ably controlled by the police, thronged Hawthorndene Oval.' (Coromandel 12 November 1954)

'Our Diary shows there will be a fireworks display and barbecue at the Blackwood Oval, followed by dancing at the Boys Club Hall.' (Coromandel 21 October 1955)

'The RSL fireworks next Saturday really does include something for everybody. One of the happiest reminders is that the evening meal may be obtained nicely cooked and piping hot, on the spot.' (Coromandel 4 November 1955)

'A lot of money went up in smoke last

While dogs retreated howling to the depths Saturday, but the occasion being what it was, nobody minded as Guy Fawkes Day was celebrated in great style. The RSL and Sports Association arranged a wonderful display and a wonderful evening at the Blackwood Sports Ground, when over 1,500 cars and many more spectators came along to the lovely evening, dark and only pleasantly cool after a heavy storm on Friday. The semi-circle of stalls, the huge bonfire, and the central fireworks display made an exciting rendezvous for all ages.

Oddly enough, there was only one guy to be judged, despite chants of ...

Guy, guy

Stick 'im up 'high.'

There was warm support for the many attractions, and the barbecue proved irresistible as the scent of chops and sausages drifted across the oval.' (Coromandel 11 November

Due to the increasing number of accidents involving children and fireworks, the banning of Guy Fawkes Night was enforced in South Australia in the 1970s. Most displays of fireworks, at various times of the year, are now professionally organised events.

Adelaide Airport Essential Asphalt Resurfacing Works




Adelaide Airport Limited (AAL) is undertaking essential asphalt resurfacing works for the main runway and adjacent taxiways until August 2024. These maintenance works are an important part of ensuring the safety and serviceability of aircraft operations at Adelaide

To minimise disruptions to daily flight schedules, construction works will mostly be carried out during the existing curfew hours (11pm to 6am) for up to 6 nights per week. There will be times where the main runway will be closed for works to be undertaken and the cross runway will be utilised for arrivals and departures of curfew exempted flights. On average, there are approximately 10 aircraft movements per night, and up to 15 aircraft movements on a busy night during the curfew hours, the majority of which are emergency services and freight operators.

The temporary changes in flight paths used may be noticeable to residents who live to the south-east or north-west of the airport.

Join in forum to discuss our role in reducing landfill

WHAT can our community do to reduce

Reducing waste by changing consumer habits is one important approach. What else can be done to reduce rubbish from going to landfill is the focus of the Blackwood Action Group's (BAG) next public meeting in November.

At BAG's last public meeting, the focus was on 'recycling', seeking to clarify what rubbish goes into which bin, and where depositories for non-recyclables can be found. A helpful summary created by Andrew Tidswell, Convenor of Sustainable Communities Group, can be found on BAG's web-

According to City of Mitcham's Sept 2023 Overview of Waste Management report ... 11,453 tonnes of rubbish (419kg average per household) went to landfill during 2022/23 from Mitcham.

During this period 48.9% of material in the landfill bin could have been recycled through the yellow or FOGO bin, and if all compostable material was put in the green/FOGO bin, it could save Council \$573,000 per year. Clearly we need to do better!

Andrew Tidswell will chair the conversation, with environment champions sharing what they are doing to reduce landfill, locally and in other communities.

BAG is hoping that local people will help devise strategies for our community to play their part in helping to reduce this enormous waste problem polluting the environment.

BAG's next public meeting will be held at Blackwood Memorial Hall, 21 Coromandel Parade, on Wednesday 22 November at 7.30pm.

We hope you can join in this conversation to create an action plan to reduce our landfill footprint.

IN BLACKWOOD we have had a Rotary Club in our area for 53 vears. Our charter was signed on September 14, 1970 and the club has met in the Blackwood area since that time.

All Rotary Clubs are sponsored by a parent club, our parent club is located at Mitcham. and we continue to meet with Mitcham as the first meeting of the year.

The Rotary Club of Blackwood has sponsored 2 clubs; Flagstaff Hill in 1978 and Coromandel Valley in 1992. We still have close connections with both clubs.

All Rotary Clubs have a joint vision which is "together, we see a world unite and take action to create lasting change - across the globe, in our communities and in ourselves".

We do this by promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, supporting education, growing local economies, and protecting the environ-

Along with all Rotary Clubs we have been involved with Polio Plus which is Rotary's biggest international projects which has run for more than 35 years and has reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since the first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

A Brief History ... as well as being involved in international projects our club has been very involved with the local community in our 53 year

In 1974 we made our first major donation to contribute to the building of the St Johns Ambulance Centre in Blythewood Street Blackwood, this facility is still used as a youth Division centre today.

Our club ran the first fair in 1975 with borrowed equipment, so the club started to make its own shelters in 1976. In 1982, the club donated \$10,000 to assist the blind in Bangladesh.

The Rotary Club of Blackwood ran it's first Art Show in 1984 in the Blackwood High School with 450 entries. We have held annual art shows at Blackwood High School since that time and is an event that continues to attract artists and visitors.

1992 was another big year with a donation made to Meals on Wheels which was sited at the Blackwood Masonic Lodge. This was also the first of our 'Guess Who's Coming to Dinner' which is a much-enjoyed social occasion.

Current Rotary Club of Blackwood Projects ..

In the last few years our club has been involved in a number of projects that have both a local and international impact.

We have donated with other South Australian Rotary Clubs to establish a dismountable medical centre in the Ukraine, provided assistance to the Ukrainian Association to allow the children of Ukrainian refugees to attend a camp, and worked with other clubs in our area to raise the money to purchase a 10,000 Litre water tank at the Cherry Gardens CFS.

In conjunction with the Rotary Club of Coromandel Valley we are raising the funds to establish 2 bike tracks at the rear of Blackwood Primary School.

While, in the coming year, we will be raising money to assist in building a further medical centre in the Ukraine and to assist funding the 'Days for Girls' which provide increased access to menstrual products and vital health information for women and girls worldwide.

How to be comfortable in hot weather

OUR changing climate is heading us into a long hot summer ... it would be good if our governments took serious action to reduce fossil fuel extraction and use.

There are however, many things we can do to minimise the impact of hotter weather on our health and well-being.

Last month, I mentioned how ancient cultures prioritised resting during the hottest parts of the day. This time, I focus on what we can do to manage our homes and the changes we can make to them to maintain comfortable conditions.

Managing our homes

- · Keep windows and doors closed on hot days. Open windows in early mornings and evenings to flush out hot air.
- Note which rooms are the most comfortable when it's hot and spend more time in them.
- · Close curtains and blinds on hot days.
- Be smart with air conditioning, only cooling areas we are occupying and only to the extent needed to be comfortable.
- Have indoor plants. Moisture evaporating from leaves cools the air. Being amongst greenery also makes us feel more comfortable.

Adapting our homes

Most of our homes are badly designed. Preventing heat from getting inside is the key to summer comfort.

- · Shade windows from the direct sun with blinds. pergolas and greenery, particularly east and west facing windows. Shade cloth can also make a difference.
- · Plant quick growing shrubs and vines on north, east and west sides of houses to provide summer shade.
- Lots of garden greenery can reduce the air temperature at least five degrees by natural evaporative cooling effects.
- Improve insulation especially in roof spaces.
- Install foam sealing strips around external doors and windows to keep hot air out.
- Circulating ceiling fans provide cooling effects and are much cheaper to run than air condi-
- Consider adding double glazing to some windows. Adding plastic sheeting to windows can create a cheap double glazing effect.
- Consider putting up temporary insulation panels over windows in hot weather.

Every home can be improved to make it save energy and maintain comfortable conditions in hot weather.

Managing ourselves

- Wear light, loose-fitting clothes, especially made of natural fibres.
- Stay in the shade as much as possible.
- Use a spray bottle of water to cool the skin.
- Have a cool shower before bed to reduce body temperature
- · Regularly drink water to stay hydrated.



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


Roof' and the ballets of Tchaikovsky. After a short break, the concert ends with the sublime 'Unfinished' Symphony by Schubert. something for everyone.


